## FROM ONE OF OUR OWN

The following piece was written last October. I thought of it after Pastor Good's message on July 23. It seems as if lately life has been full of emergencies and unexpected events. Life is always full and the feeling that "something needs to be done" often accompanies it. Remembering to slow down and take your time is always good advice even when life seems to be pushing you forward. To relax and know that God is with you is truly a blessing we need to remember.

Just take a moment to think. How often have you heard, or said it? TAKE YOUR TIME. Too many times or maybe not enough. Who have you said it to? And why haven't you listened?

Why is it so important to take action immediately? It seems as if in our culture to hesitate is to give up. Why didn't you do something? Maybe you didn't know what to do. Who in our culture can admit to that? It is difficult to take time. We all feel the pressure to begin, accomplish, continue, and finish. Yet, we know better than to run with our eyes closed. This is not a heroic response.

At this moment, we need to take time. Time for God, our families, and our hopes for the future can't be left until later. The thing we fear in later is "late". We need to hesitate in our push for the next thing or the finish line. The finish line in most cases is an imaginary one, that is soon replaced by another false mark of completion. Life just goes on until we depart to the next stage of it. We are promised unending life so what is the rush when we have been given the journey.

I used to hear stories about my father-in-law who on the family vacation was always concerned about making "good time" when they departed. Laughingly, it was said that this fixation was a result of his time spent driving truck. Once he arrived, he would soon be anxious to make "good time" on the trip home. Driving in circles, is this how we make "good time"?

Today's life coaches always talk about making short term and long term goals. I like to think of short term goals as where on a walk the park bench is located. You know the place where you can catch your breath before going on or turning back. Both choices are possible but need a place of stillness to be considered. Short term goal "benches" let you rest for awhile. Long term goals are just signs that say how far ahead the "park" is. I like that word "park". To park is to make a commitment to stay awhile. A long term goal should do that, let you stay awhile and enjoy being there.

I know what you are thinking. What about those times of emergency? Yes, it can happen. By its very definition an emergency requires you to be prepared to react or act. How do you do that? Are you ready because you took the time to be prepared? Is it possible to plan for the unexpected? Can an emergency be predicted or be thought possible? Can you be prepared for every surprise in life? An emergency can be considered an unplanned stop caused by upset or love. When you are moving very fast in life, forward or backward, do you know why? Do you know what the emergency is in your life, what created it, and how to respond? Can you answer that question? Emergencies jolt us into using what we know. So take time to learn something about the important things in your life. Be able to answer the question, "Why is that important to me?" The more you know about what you consider important the better. How can you protect or pursue what you don't understand.

Everyone feels as if they live in the most difficult of times. And they are right. It is difficult to live now and it was difficult before and will be in the future. For something to be difficult implies a challenge to be faced. A journey does not take place only on level land. So what are your challenges? Life will recreate them until you face them with humility and creativity. A "one response fits all" will not work. It will only wear you out and leave you confused and bruised. So take your time.

Traveling within this life can be quite an adventure. The landscape is reconfigured by each experience we have and the people we find traveling with us, whatever the speed and direction of our travels. This congestion of travelers can make us feel caught. Seeking out clear paths may make us lonely and cause us to question our decisions in life. When too many travelers seem to be going in a direction we need to ask ourselves why. If too few, we still need to ask why. In fact, we always need to ask why, even when we think we know the answer. Take your time. God is with you.
