It's September – Must Be Time to Start Believing Again!

In a society that historically professed itself as "Christian,"
I am continually amazed at how "we Christians" put faith
on the back-burner. Our efforts to make faith secondary
often come in small subtle ways, spread over long time
periods, so that we get slowly swept up in the tide of
complacency. Let me retrace some of the changes
(although this list will reveal my advanced age):

- 1. When I was a child I remember when American society remembered the Sabbath. Blue laws made sure that Sunday was a day of rest as stores and places of business were closed. But then an extra day to make and spend money became more important than Sabbath and the Blue Laws disappeared.
- 2. When I was a teenager school districts realized the importance of faith, so much so that Wednesday evening was known as "church night." Homework was less on Wednesday evenings and there were virtually no school activities scheduled so that churches could have confirmation classes, Lenten services, and mid-week prayer services. But eventually "church night" disappeared.

- 3. When I became a young adult, churches began to question whether people really wanted to give 2 or 3 hours on a Sunday morning, so much so that some congregations stopped having a Sunday school hour. Everything was combined into 1 hour, Sunday school for the kids and worship for the adults. I guess the assumption was that you don't start worshipping God until you become an adult.
- 4. When I was a young pastor I suddenly found myself at odds each September with a whole host of confirmation class parents. No matter what evening I picked for confirmation class it always interfered with someone's scout meeting; football, basketball, baseball, soccer, karate, gymnastics, or swimming practice; clarinet or piano lessons; and one year even horseback riding lessons. There was always great pressure to do confirmation on Sunday mornings, taking away the confirmand's opportunity to attend Sunday school. But this pressure soon subsided as youth football and soccer leagues started having Sunday games. I soon became convinced that the parents wanted the kids confirmed but felt that the classes should be optional.
- 5. Later as a pastor, churches started believing that Sunday mornings interfered with summer. So, Sunday school was cancelled for the summer (this causes a dilemma for children based upon number 3 above) and worship services started earlier so people could get out and get going. Then in September everything started up again. "Startup Sunday" (sometimes known as "Rally Day") was always the first Sunday after Labor Day, however recently this too has been pushed back as people began to realize that the first few Sundays in September were a good time to go to the beach. Eventually I began to think that Christians only believe in God September through May, take the summer off, and then start believing again in September.

Now I know that one does not have to be in church to believe in God. I have heard all of the stories about how people find God on the golf course (although with my game I find that hard to believe) or walking through the woods or walking along the beach. But corporate worship, Christian education, and finding ways to be in service strengthen one's commitment and help us keep faith on the front-burner.

If faith is believing in the One who has created us, given us this gift we call life, and promised to walk with us through this gift teaching us what it means to live as one created in God's image, then faith should be the priority that defines all of life's priorities.

What about you: is your faith in God the center that defines the rest of your life, or is it merely a Sunday morning school-year activity?
